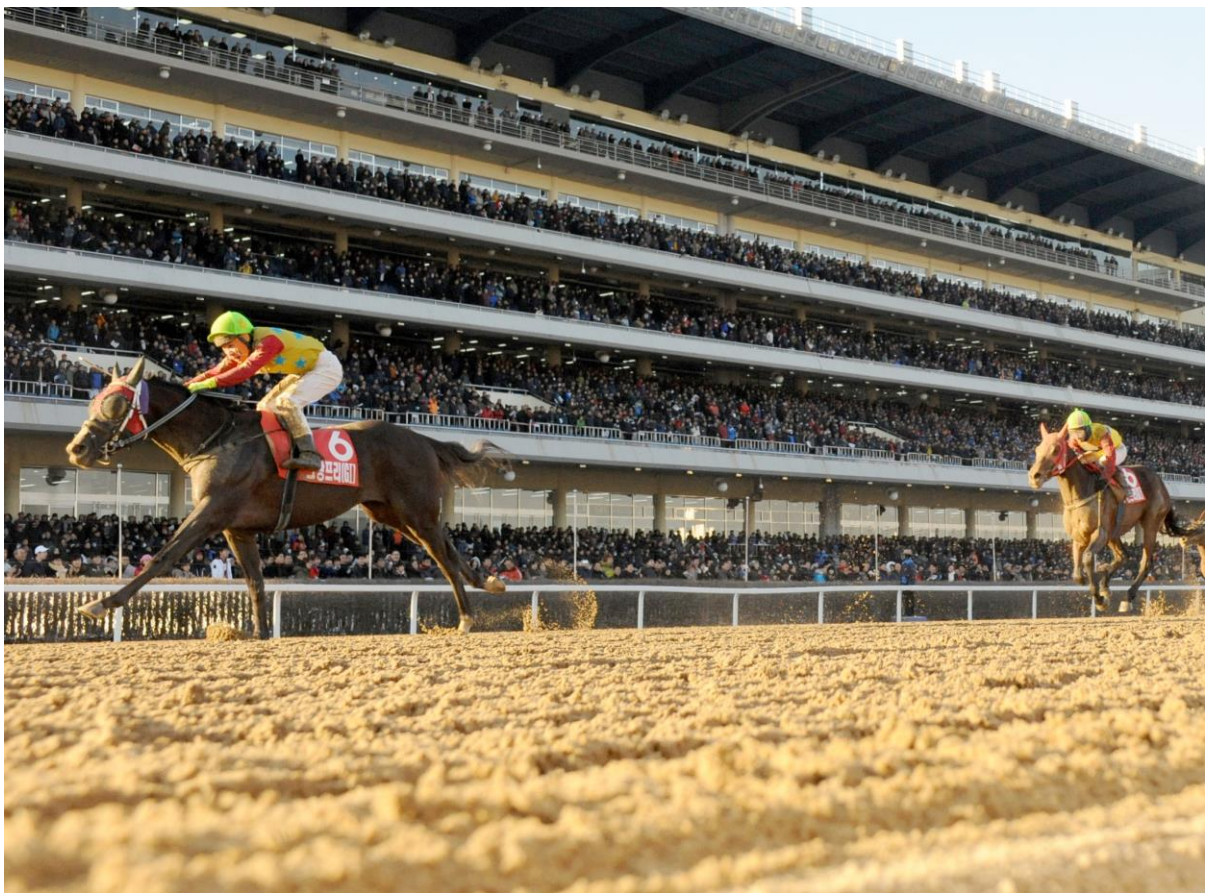

2013 Champion 3-Year-Old



Indie Band [Ecton Park – Plie (Dixieland Band)]

The winner 6 out of 9 starts in 2013 including the Gyeongnam Do-Min Ilbo Stakes, Indie Band didn't run in the Korean Derby but came 3rd in the Minister's Cup before defeating older horses in the President's Cup and the season-ending Grand Prix Stakes.

Jigeum I Sungan [Ingrandire – Solmaru (Mujaazif)]

The 2012 Korean Derby winner began the year with 6 straight wins including the Owners' Association Trophy and Jeju Governor's Cup. He ended his racing career with 3rd place in the President's Cup and 2nd in the Grand Prix Stakes

2013 Champion Filly & Mare



Speedy First [Menifee – Speedy Deedy (Victory Gallop)]

While she couldn't win any of the races on the Queens' Tour, - Useung Touch, Yongduseong and Secret Whisper taking those honours - any filly that does the Korean Derby and Korean Oaks double, as Speedy First did in 2013 is a deserving winner of this prize.

The Triple Crown

KRA Cup Mile – 1600M – Busan Race Park – April 6, 2013 – **Sting Ray**

Korean Derby – 1800M – Seoul Race Park – May 19, 2013 – **Speedy First**

Korean Oaks – 1800M – Busan Race Park – August 25, 2013 – **Speedy First**

Minister's Cup – 2000M – Seoul Race Park – October 6, 2013 – **Major King**

The year began with **Yapung** as the overall 2012 Juvenile Champion, having won the Breeders' Cup race in December but by the time the KRA Cup Mile – the "Korean Guineas" came around on the first Sunday in April, it was **Sting Ray**, who was firmly established as favourite for Triple Crown Honours. In the Cup Mile, he didn't disappoint:

Sting Ray (Forest Camp), who came into the race off the back of 2 consecutive impressive wins was always travelling well under Kim Dong Young as **Harley** (Menifee) set the early pace. As they entered the home straight and spread across the track, **Sting Ray** hit the front and never looked like being caught as he stretched away for a 4-length win.



Raon Boss (Pico Central) finished a strong second, giving British jockey Darryll Holland a great result in his first Korean Classic race.

The Peter Wolsley trained **Fantastic Jazz** (Menifee) was a close 3rd. Wolsley's other-runner, the slightly better fancied **Amell's Atom** (Menifee) finished 4th.

Sting Ray is a half-brother of 2012 Korean Oaks winner Rising Glory, through their dam Straight Cash. Straight Cash herself was a top class filly who ran in Korea and won the 2005 JRA Trophy race. With 2 Classic winners, she has already established herself as among the top broodmares too.

That victory meant that Sting Ray made the trip to Seoul in May as favourite for the Korean Derby. Things didn't go his way that day though as he trailed home in 6th, behind a filly who had missed the Cup Mile.

Speedy First (Meniffee) came in to the race off 4 consecutive wins and was sent off the 4/1 second favourite behind **Sting Ray** who punters had backed into odds-on.

Outsiders **Heungnyong Bisang** (Ft.Stockton) and **Titan** (Creek Cat) made the early pace but the pack was bunched tightly together as they entered the final corner. Turning into the home straight they fanned out across the track but it still looked anyone's race until Joe Fujii got to work on Speedy First a furlong and a half out. The pair sped away from the rest and never looked back.

The margin of victory on the line was 2 lengths with 47/1 chance **Unhae** (Ingrandire) finishing 2nd and **Major King** (Pico Central) 3rd.

For jockey Joe Fujii, it was the 60th winner of what has been a quite remarkable 11 months in Korea. The 29-year old won the Grand Prix Stakes on another filly, Gamdonguibada, in December 2012 becoming the first foreign jockey to do so and on Speedy First, completed a unique



double by achieving the distinction of being the first foreigner to win the Derby.

The last filly to win the Korean Derby was Sangseung Ilro in 2009. She returned to her home track of Busan and was sent-off as long odds-on favourite for the Oaks. Her subsequent defeat was one of the biggest shocks in Korean racing in years.

Speedy First's only appearance since the Derby had seen her put Joe Fujii flat on his back on the track within seconds of exiting the gate. Come August and Oaks time, punters weren't deterred and like Sangseung Ilro, Speedy First was sent off as the odds-on favourite.

They had no need to worry as, while Speedy First needed a little bit of help finding her top gear at the top of the home straight, once she found it, the result was never in doubt with the margin of victory a full 7 lengths on the line.

While a Triple Crown wasn't on the line, Speedy First's Derby and Oaks wins meant that there was plenty of interest in the filly when she returned to Seoul in early October to make her attempt on the final jewel, the Minister's Cup.

However, while sent off as the short-priced favourite, she was never in the race and trailed home a tailed-off last.

Third in the Derby in May, the grey Major King was a 9/1 chance at the start and was immediately sent into the lead by jockey Jo Sung Gon.



When the expected challenges from Speedy First and Derby-second **Unhae** failed to materialise, it was left to outsider **High Five** and Gyeongnam DoMin Ilbo winner **Indie Band** – of whom we would hear much more later in the season - to apply the pressure.

They didn't come close. Instead, Major King kicked on for victory, leading his fellow Busan raiders home by 2-lengths on the line.

Major King is by the late Brazilian sire Pico Central, who died earlier in 2013. and the victory was his 6th from 10 career starts to date. For trainer Kim Sang Seok, it was a 3rd Classic winner, having won both the Korean Derby and Oaks in 2008 with Ebony Storm and Jeolho Chance respectively. For jockey Jo Sung Gon, Busan's current champion, it was a 4th Classic and his 2nd in this race, having previously won it in on Sangseung Ilro in 2009.

At the end of 2013 it was announced that both Speedy First and Major King would spend at least the first part of 2014 training and racing in the United States.

The International Jockey Challenge 2013

Since its first edition in 2005, the International Jockey Challenge has become a mainstay on the Korea racing calendar. The event sees not only international jockeys but also delegations from racing authorities from around the world visit Seoul. In 2013 the visiting jockeys were:

Niall McCullagh – Ireland representing Horse Racing Ireland

Noel Callow – Australia representing the Selangor Turf Club of Malaysia

Fausto Durso – Brazil representing the Macau Jockey Club

Raymond Danielson – South Africa representing the Gold Circle Turf Club

Yucel Bilik – Turkey representing the Turkey Jockey Club

Shinichiro Akiyama – Japan representing the Japan Racing Authority

Fausto Durso won the series finale YTN Cup on **Choichoro** but a 2nd place finish in that race was more than enough to secure overall victory for Australian Noel Callow



“King” Callow won the opening Macau Jockey Club Trophy on day 1 of the challenge and added the Selangor Turf Club Trophy to his haul on day 2 to amass 51 points and take home the \$15,000 bonus.

He looked set to add a third victory as **Dongseo Daeryuk** had the lead in the final furlong of the YTN

Cup, until **Choichoro** (Concept Win), under Brazilian jockey Fausto Durso came through on the outside to snatch the win.

Second place in the championship and \$7,000 went to YTN Cup winner Durso, with 35 points. Moon Se Young was the highest scoring member of the home team with 25 points for third place, finishing in 3rd place and securing the \$3,000 bonus.



Korea Vs Japan – Overseas-Trained Horses Run in Korea for 1st

Time / Korean-Trained Watts Village Wins in Tokyo

Overseas-trained horses ran in Korea for the very first time as three Japanese runners made the trip to Seoul for the SBS ESPN Goodwill Cup on September 1. Three Korean horses went to Tokyo in November for the return leg.

After a long process to win government approval due to Korea's strict quarantine rules, the Japanese entrants arrived in Korea on August 22 and were transported directly to a special quarantine zone in Seoul Racecourse.

In front of the SBS ESPN TV cameras, the visitors, 8-year old **Final Score**, 9-year old **Tosen Archer** and 5-year old **Big Gulliver** lined-up against 11 Korean-trained horses with Grand Prix Stakes and Busan Metropolitan Stakes winner **Tough Win** heading the home challenge in the 7-furlong test.

Sent off as the least favoured of the three visiting Japanese horses, **Tosen Archer** (Barathea), was kept at the back of the field by veteran jockey Fumio Matoba in the opening stages of the 7-furlong race.

With three furlongs to run, Matoba started to bring his mount forward but still had plenty to do as **Pureun Miso** (Malibu Moon) and **Watts Village** (Forestry) led the field into the home straight.



Pre-race favourite Tough Win struggled to get into gear but there were no such problems for Tosen Archer, who flew down the outside to hit the front 20 metres from the line and extend to win by a length.

Watts Village hung on well for 2nd while filly **Indian Blue** scored a very creditable 3rd. Tough Win, Korea's best hope pre-race, was relatively disappointing 4th. The remaining two Japanese challengers, **Big Gulliver** and **Final Score** finished behind those in 5th and 6th respectively.

Tosen Archer re-appeared for the return leg, called the “Interaction Cup” at Ohi Racecourse in Tokyo on November 26. However, on a glorious night for Korean racing, Watts Village went one better this time and snatched the unlikeliest of victories over the Japanese horses on their own track.



After coming so close to winning the first leg of the Korea vs Japan challenge in Seoul back in September, **Watts Village** made no mistake this time as, under Seo Seung Un, he led from gate-to-wire to record a famous victory in the Japanese capital.

It was a perfectly timed ride from Seo. Watts Village took an early lead and maintained it as his challengers massed behind. In the final furlong they pressed and pressed. The pressure was relentless and they came so close to sweeping by but gamely, gallantly, Watts Village held on.

In a race that was always to be dictated by early speed, the other Korean challengers **Fly Top Queen** and **Full Moon Party** gave what they could but were found wanting. Watts Village nailed it.

A three-year-old colt, Watts Village (Forestry) had, by virtue of his runner-up position to Tosen Archer in Seoul in September, already achieved an official rating of 100.

This qualified him to run in Dubai in Spring of 2014, however his connections opted not to take up the opportunity, preferring to return him to Seoul.

Stakes and Listed Race Winners

In 2013, there were a total of 39 Stakes or Listed races in Korea, starting with the Listed Herald Business Cup on January 5th and finishing with the Group 1 Grand Prix Stakes on December 15.

While the SBS Goodwill Cup in September was the first Korean race ever to feature foreign-trained horses, the Grand Prix Stakes became the first Korean race to be simulcasted overseas as it was shown at Kranji Racecourse in Singapore.

Here is a full run-down of all those races through the year as well as a look at some notable winners:

Useung Touch (Menifee) won the Korean Oaks in 2011 and came back into form in early 2013, winning the Ttukseom Cup, the first leg of the Queens' Tour for fillies & mares, having previously finished a shock 2nd in the 2012 Grand Prix Stakes.

However, despite going on to win her next race, the five-year old could only manage finishes of 5th and 4th in the remaining two legs of the Tour.

Despite winning the Sports Seoul Cup, the capital's main Oaks trial, the 3-year-old didn't attempt the fillies' Classic in August, however, she did go to Busan in November and managed to finish a close 2nd in the Gyeongnam Governor's Cup.

When she did, she was immediately impressive, easily winning her first 4 starts, including August’s Singapore Turf Club Trophy. She went on to represent Korea in Tokyo in November, where she suffered her first defeat.

An unsuccessful attempt on the Grand Prix Stakes a month later brought the curtain down on the 5-year-old mare's racing career.

As 2013 drew to a close, the New Year favourite for the 3-year-old Classics was **Cheongnyong Bisang** (Volponi).

He became champion juvenile of 2013 by winning the Breeders' Cup at Seoul in December, beating the best 2-year-olds from both Seoul and Busan.

A generational shift occurred at the end of 2013. The year which started with Tough Win and Dangdae Bulpae ended with the 3-year-old **Indie Band** (Ecton Park) winning both the President's Cup and Grand Prix Stakes. He headed into 2014 as the horse to beat on the Korean peninsula.

Korean Thoroughbred Rankings 2013

Jigeum I Sungan (Ingrandire) topped the Korean Handicapper's rankings at the end of 2013, with a Korean rating of 130. He was one place ahead of Gyeongbudaero (Menifee) and two ahead of Indie Band (Ecton Park), who beat both of them in the President's Cup and Grand Prix Stakes at the end of the season.

The Classic winners didn't end the year rated highly. Korean Derby and Oaks heroine Speedy First was awarded 118, one point below Minister's Cup winner Major King and two ahead of KRA Cup Mile winner Sting Ray.

In a year where the track's horses won all the Classics and – with the honorable exception of Jigeum I Sungan – Stakes races open to both tracks, Busan horses dominate the list. The South-Coast's monopolization of the biggest races showed no signs of ending in 2013.

The highest rated filly or mare was from the capital, however, with Joy Lucky (Vicar) being awarded 126.

Retired in 2013

We said goodbye to some champions in 2013:

Dongbanui Gangja (USA) [Broken Vow – Maremaid (Storm Bird)]

A year after his last start, US bred champion **Dongbanui Gangja** [Broken Vow-Maremaid (Storm Bird)] was formally retired in February 2013, aged 8. A two-time winner of the Grand Prix Stakes, Korea's most prestigious race he also won the Owners' Association Trophy on his way to 20 wins from 35 lifetime starts.



A \$20,000 purchase from the OBS Spring Sale of Two-Year-Olds in Training in April 2007, Dongbanui Gangja had a solid but unspectacular beginning to his racing career, winning 3 times from 6 starts as a 2-year old. He continued to develop as a 3-year old culminating in his first Grand Prix win in December 2008 beating 2007 winner **Bally Brae** by 4 lengths.

That was the 3rd win in a sequence of 12 consecutive triumphs that saw him become the first horse to simultaneously hold the Grand Prix Stakes and Owners' Association Trophy. He successfully defended his Grand Prix title in December 2009 with a dominant 6 length win.

His remarkable run of victories finally came to an end on his first trip to Busan for the Metropolitan City Mayor's Cup in July 2010. Billed as the first showdown between Dongbanui Gangja and the then young upstart import **Tough Win** (Yonaguska), Dongbanui Gangja ran inexplicably wide on the final turn, eliminating himself from contention.

This began a period of several races where he became very difficult to control including in that year's Grand Prix when he could only manage 7th place behind **Mister Park**.

2011 saw a return to some kind of form and he managed a creditable 2nd place on his return to the Busan Metropolitan as well as picking up 2 big handicap wins. Like all successful imported horses, however, it was becoming harder and harder to find races for him due to the handicapper. On what proved to be his final outing, in February 2012, he carried 62kg. Despite that impost, he won.

A winner of 19 of his 32 starts, Dangdae Bulpae won a Korean record 10 Stakes victories and amassed a record KRW 2.9 Billion (around US\$2.6Million) in prize money. Among those Stakes wins were three consecutive triumphs in Korea’s richest race, the President’s Cup.

Dangdae Bulpae (KOR) [Biwa Shinseiki – Indeed My Dear (Alydeed)]

By the unfashionable – and generally unsuccessful – Japanese sire **Biwa Shinseiki** and out of the Alydeed mare **Indeed My Dear**, Dangdae Bulpae debuted as a 2-year-old in 2009, running a rather inauspicious 5th place over 5-furlongs.

He won his next 4 though, which was enough to allow him to take his chance in the 2010 Spring Classics.

He could only manage 8th in the KRA Cup Mile but on his first trip to Seoul, he was an impressive 3rd in the Korean Derby behind **Cheonnyeon Daero**.



The winner that day would spend most of the rest of his career looking at Dangdae Bulpae’s tail.

Maturing in the autumn, Dangdae Bulpae won the final leg of the Triple Crown, the Minister’s Cup and then landed the first of his President’s Cups.

This set the tone for the next two years and although he had the occasional off-day – neither of his two attempts on the Grand Prix Stakes were successful – he and the late great **Mister Park** became the dominant Korean bred horses of their era.

While the 2300 metres of the Grand Pix proved out of his distance range, he did win the “Summer Grand Prix”, the Busan Mayor’s Trophy in 2012 in a another golden year that culminated in his 3rd and final President’s Cup triumph.

2013 saw him add another Stakes - the Busan Ilbo Cup in February – but injury then intervened and it was a very different Dangdae Bulpae who lined up in Seoul in November to try for his 4th

President's Cup. He ran a shadow of his former self and retirement was immediately decided on. Dangdae Bulpae had done quite enough.

Jigeum I Sungan (KOR) [Ingrandire – Solmaru (Mujaazif)]

Retired aged 4 with career figures of 13 wins from 25 starts and earnings of over US\$1.6 Million, Jigeum I Sungan – “This is the moment” in English – has been one of the stand out performers in Korean racing of the last few years. Even so, after winning on his debut race, Jigeum I Sungan didn't return to the winner's circle until his 8th start, which was his 2nd as a 3-year-old.

He was 5th in the KRA Cup Mile, the first leg of the Triple Crown, but did enough to qualify for the Derby, which he went on to win by a length.

He followed up in the autumn by taking the final jewel of the Crown, the Minister's Cup, this time by a commanding 4-lengths. A month later he ran 2nd to Dangdae Bulpae in the President's Cup but to the disappointment of punters, was kept away from the Grand Prix.



It was in 2013 though that he hit his peak. Jigeum I Sungan began the year with 6 consecutive wins, among them the Seoul Owners' Cup and the inaugural Jeju Governor's Cup.

His run finally came to an end in the Turkey Jockey Club Cup in August although he quickly bounced back from that to record what would turn out to be his last victory in September.

He closed out his career with a 3rd place in the President's Cup and then finally 2nd in the Grand Prix,

both times behind Indie Band.

Breeding: Menifee Dominates Leading Sire Race / Pico Central the best known of Sires to Pass Away in 2013

Menifee retained his Leading Sire crown by a huge margin at the end of a year where his progeny have dominated once again.



Filly **Speedy First**, who landed a Korean Derby and Oaks double was Menifee's chief money earner in a year where the Leading sire saw 14.2% of all his starters win.

Forest Camp got the closest to Menifee ahead of **Vicar** and the late **Pico Central**.

Meanwhile, **One Cool Cat** just headed **Peace Rules** in the first-crop sire race. Those latter two will have their first foals reach 3-years-ol in 2014.

Even more competition is on its way. **Chapel Royal** and **Rock Hard Ten** covered their first mares in 2013 while the end of the year saw **Hansen** make his way to Jeju.
